1.b) Volunteer Opportunities!

From staffing the till to stocking nut butters, (that's right, when are out of it on the floor it's like because we haven't had a chance to package it!) to making 50Cent snack bags, or solidarity ID cards the frigo could not function without such a great team of volunteers! In return for a 3-4 hour commitment/month, we offer you a chance to meet new people, gain new skills, (and work references, of course), and know that you are part of making frigo the great space that it is. Our volunteers also get a free membership and volunteer discounts on everything in the store, and invitations to our great volunteer parties.

2. Food Politics

In keeping with le frigo vert's commitment to anti-colonial struggle, to food and water security, to traditional farming practices, and indigenous self-determination world-wide, le frigo vert supports Israeli Apartheid Week. Here's why:

What is Israeli Apartheid Week? -- Israeli Apartheid Week (IAW) is an annual international awareness week about the nature of Israel as an apartheid system and the call for Boycott, Divestment, and Sanctions (BDS) movement, similar to the one against South African Apartheid. In Montreal, there are nine full days of awareness-raising events ranging from lectures and workshops to film screenings. For more info or a full schedule go to montreal.apartheidweek.org

Why does the Frigo support Israeli Apartheid Week? -- Well, in part, it's a simple answer. Colonialism is colonialism and whether here in Canada or elsewhere in the world, le frigo vert is committed to supporting indigenous self-determination and to standing in solidarity with anti-colonial struggles. We believe it's important to create spaces to talk about the apartheid state of Israel and how to combat it, particularly as we are situated in the midst of uncritical support for Israel. We can never forget that the Apartheid system was first instituted here in Canada against the our indigenous population. As apartheid grows in Israel, it is supported by agreements like the Canada-Israel Public Security Agreement and the Quebec-Israel Economic Accord. Recent actions such as Canada's stand-alone vote against the UN condemnation of the bombing of Gaza or Canada's recent role of acting ambassador for Israel in Venezuela (who expelled the Israeli ambassador in solidarity with Gaza), are further extensions of our governments' backing of Israeli Apartheid. It is our responsibility to challenge that support here at home.

And of course, as with any system of colonization, there is a tremendous impact on the land, on food security and water, issues which relate closely to the mandate of le frigo vert as a non-profit, healthy, equitable and organic food store.

Environmentalism, Water and Food Security -- Israel bulldozes not just homes, but entire olive groves and working farms. Fruit-bearing olive trees that were centuries old have been uprooted or destroyed by Israeli forces. And it's not just olive trees. Over all, Israel has a huge environmental impact on the land through munitions used by Israeli forces, the buildings of roads and settlements and, of course, the building of the apartheid wall. Israel annexes water from Palestine and controls how and when Palestinians have access to clean water. Israel controls if and how Palestinians have access to their farmlands, and to import and export markets. Moreover, Israeli agribusiness has negative effects on biodiverse, equitable and traditional farming practices worldwide. In addition, both from the displacement of Palestinian people, the restricted access to their lands as well as the borders controlled by Israel, Palestinians have sparse access to food and health care. In 2006 over 40% of Palestinians in Gaza and the West bank lived without food security, and another 30% were seen to be teetering on the verge. That number has increased with heightened Israel controls against the borders over the last 18 months, and most obviously with the recent attacks against the people in Gaza.

Boycott, Divestment and Sanctions against Israel -- A growing part of the struggle for Palestinian self-determination is the Boycott, Divestment and Sanctions campaign against Israel. International call for this is growing, and last week saw Hampshire College in Amherst, MA was the first North American university to divest from Israel. Here in Montreal, professors have joined the international voices calling for an academic boycott of Israel. As a food store, le frig vert takes the call for boycott seriously and encourage other food cooperatives to do the same. Furthermore, we carry equitable-trade Palestinian olive oil and in general seek out products that support the autonomy and livelihood of indigenous people and traditional and bio-diverse farming practices world-wide.

3. Featured Anti-oppression Issue

The Campus Boycott, Divestment and Sanctions movement against Israeli Apartheid.

Being a part of the Concordia community, we thought it was important to look at the ways in Concordia and more broadly, universities and student movements world-wide, are engaging in solidarity with the people of Palestine.

The following is a short compendium, with extensive links, about the growing Boycott, Divestment and Sanctions movement against Israel across campuses. You can also check out websites such as right2edu for more information.

Not in our Name Concordia - Jewish voices opposing Zionism

To the campus community:

We have started a new group here at Concordia to actively support anti-apartheid organizing on our campus and to counter the often-expressed notions that equate all Jews with Zionism and further equate an Israeli Apartheid analysis and standing in solidarity with Palestinians resisting colonialism with anti-Semitism. It is false to assume that all Jews share a single view towards the state of Israel.

A number of high profile, well-financed Zionist organizations claim to represent the Jewish community in Canada in its entirety. They do not. What they represent is a Zionist political stance; an unconditional defense of the policies of the state of Israel. These organizations speak and act for themselves alone, and not in our name. And so we have come together, under the banner Not in Our Name, to reject the ways that the Zionist project attempts to assimilate our identities and our voices for their own purposes.

Not In Our Name believes that both Israel and Canada must be held accountable for their violations of human rights. We stand in solidarity with the Palestinian people, as with all indigenous independence movements. In particular we stand against Israel's racist laws and Canada's complicity, while calling for a solidarity that stretches beyond borders and nationalities.

Our experiences are diverse--whether from Canada, Israel or elsewhere--but all of us are unified as Jews implicated in the struggle against Israeli Apartheid. As a group, we endorse the upcoming Israeli Apartheid Week and are encouraged by the range of events being offered from March 1-9th. Many of us have helped organize IAW and are committed to ensuring an opposition to the Zionist rhetoric echoing throughout the halls of Concordia.

While we recognize the historic nature of anti-Semitism throughout the world and oppose anti-Semitism wherever we see it we believe it is impossible to detach violent acts against Jews from violence enacted by the Israeli establishment. We as Jews believe it is important to recognize the nature of Israel as an apartheid system and as we fight in our daily lives against anti-Semitism in all of its forms, we are obliged to fight against all forms of oppression, and in particular those perpetrated in our name.

Also Montreal, over 100 academics have made the public call for an academic boycott of Israel. The following was released at the end of January, from Montreal college and university workers:

A ceasefire is not enough to achieve peace between Palestine and Israel

We are a group of teachers and employees at Quebec colleges and universities who stand in solidarity with the Palestinian people, and with the people of Gaza who have suffered through the Israeli siege as targets of Israel's brutal military attack. It will take more than ceasefires to bring a just and lasting peace in Palestine and Israel. We are acting in response to an appeal for support issued January 2, 2009 by the Palestinian Federation of Unions of University Professors and Employees. In the wake of the Israeli bombing of the Islamic University of Gaza, the Federation of Unions has urged academics around the world to support a boycott of Israeli academic institutions.

We support this call and place it within a wider campaign of boycott, divestment, and sanctions. The struggle against apartheid in South Africa was supported through boycotts, divestment, and sanctions. We support a similar strategy against the Israeli state.

We will undertake actions within our own institutions to promote education on this issue, to support students, faculty, and

employees to speak out on this question, and to pressure the institutions in which we work to participate in a boycott, divestment, and sanctions campaign that aims for a just and lasting settlement for the Palestinian people.

We strongly condemn the government of Canada's position on the ongoing conflict in Gaza and for its bilateral trade

agreements that help sustain Israeli military actions. The Harper government has condemned Hamas, an elected government, as a terrorist organization. Yet it consistently supports the government of Israel, which has used weapons causing mass destruction on a mainly civilian population, including attacks on children and schools, and has violated International prohibitions against collective punishment through its blockade of the Gaza strip.

We call on the Harper government to re-evaluate its policies and to unequivocally condemn the Israeli siege and assault on Gaza, which constitute serious violations of international and humanitarian law. We further demand that the Israeli government immediately cease its violence.

As well, we urge that all economic relations between Israel and the governments of Canada and Quebec — including trade

agreements – be suspended until there is not only a just and lasting peace for the Palestinian people, but that Israel, in compliance with international law, recognizes the right of the Palestinian people to self-determination.

On February 22nd, Canadian Union of Public Employees – Ontario passed a motion put forward by the University Workers about the right to education in Palestine and an academic boycott.

The motion:

- Affirms the right of Palestinians to education; and
- Encourages member locals to hold educational events on campuses; and
- Calls for research into links between in universities in Ontario and Israel that benefit the state of Israel's military; and
- Where such links exist, calls for coalitions on campuses to oppose them.

What does CUPE Ontario mean by “Academic Boycott”?

It is important to understand that this is not a call to boycott individual Israeli academics. Rather, the boycott call is aimed at Ontario universities and any institutional connections pertaining to research that help the military of the state of Israel. CUPE Ontario is taking this action in response to an appeal from the Palestinian Federation of Unions of University Professors and Employees.

Why boycott Israeli military research?

The recent assault on Gaza has seen the total destruction of the Palestinian educational system. The Israeli military has bombed numerous universities and schools. On January 7, 2009, Israeli forces killed over 40 Palestinian civilians who had taken shelter in a United Nations school. The aim of the motion boycott is to put pressure on Israel to fully comply with international law, by cutting off research support and Ontario connections to those institutions involved in the oppression of the Palestinian people. The call for a boycott of academic institutions is part of a broader campaign of Israeli boycott, divestment and sanctions (BDS) that CUPE Ontario had already approved in 2006.

Is CUPE Ontario the only one calling for this? Who else supports these actions?

This campaign has wide support. Just a few weeks ago, the President of the United Nations General Assembly, Father Miguel D'Escoto Brockman, stated:

"More than twenty years ago we in the United Nations took the lead from civil society when we agreed that sanctions were required to provide a nonviolent means of pressuring South Africa to end its violations. Today, perhaps we in the United Nations

should consider following the lead of a new generation of civil society, who are calling for a similar non-violent campaign of boycott, divestment and sanctions to pressure Israel to end its violations."

In the first week of January some 300 academics signed a letter to Prime Minister Stephen Harper calling on the Canadian Government to institute sanctions against Israel.

The academic boycott is also supported by academics within Israel.

Across the world, the movement is growing on campuses.

At the end of January, Hampshire College became the first university to divest from mutual funds that invest in Israeli apartheid profiteers such as Motorola and Caterpillar. After the initial announcement, they have come under great attack, being both threatened and bribed by the Zionist lobby to reinvest. 4. Recipes

Ramen Red Cabbage Salad

Dressing:

½C olive oil

6 TBSP red balsamic vinegar

2 TBSP sugar (or equivalent sweetener)

Seasoning from 1 pkg Ramen Noodles (you will use the noodles in the salad)

Mix well together and toss over salad below:

Salad:

1 small head red cabbage, sliced
1 ½ cups toasted, sliced almonds
¾ c sunflower or pepita seeds
1 smallish red onion, chopped
Noodles from 1 package of Ramen Noodles, crumbled
2 carrots, grated

Carrot Cashew Loaf (serve it hot with gravy or cold like a paté!)

Ingredients:

1 TBSP olive oil
1 Med-Lrg onion - chopped
2 cloves garlic – chopped
2C carrots, cooked and mashed
2C ground cashews
1C fine bread crumbs (or – if gluten-intolerant, use toasted buckwheat flour or even cooked, mashed grain of choice)
1 TBSP tahini
1 tsp yeast extract (marmite or vegemite) – optional – can also use TBSP nut'l yeast of just add more tahini
Juice of ½ lemon
½ C water from cooking carrots (or veggie soup stock or warm water)
pinch salt

Prep:

1. Grease and flour a standard loaf pan and preheat oven to 350
2. Heat olive oil in pan and sauté onions and garlic until soft
3. In a bowl, mix onions and garlic with carrots, then add cashews, bread crumbs (or substitute), tahini, lemon juice and seeds.
4. Add water saved from carrots, until all ingredients are combined and moist
5. Transfer into loaf pan and cover with foil.
6. Bake at 350 for about 50 minutes (until it is cooked throughout)
7. Remove foil and bake for another 10 minutes to brown the top.
8. Serve hot or cold

you can also do the prep work in advance and freeze before baking, or after baking the first 50 minutes. Then, when you are ready to serve, just defrost it, and bake it uncovered for 10-15 minutes

Snow Balls

On a lovely, snowy day, leave a .5 litre container outside to catch the snow (keep your eyes on it though and don't be fooled into thinking that yellow-coloured will mean a lemon sorbet!)

Add ¼ C sugar

½ C vanilla, strawberry or chocolate soy milk

stir until desired consistency and enjoy!!!!
